P-Card Incentives

The P-Card CUA had another successful 12 months with increases of 18% in turnover, 13% in transactions and 12% in number of cardholders. The CUAs financial incentives, which are linked to the total throughput of agencies via a percentage of savings returned, have been calculated for the 2011 calendar year. A total of \$2.1 million is soon to be distributed and deposited in some agency's accounts.
